The Board of Trustees read and discussed this consultation and its feedback. The following are ACTIONS that the Board have prioritised for 2018

• To investigate the interest throughout the school in Kapa Haka and following the feedback seek to support those students by connecting them with other local school groups that have specific Kapa Haka groups.

- To investigate how to continue school wide waiata and action songs that continue to enable our students to
  - welcome manuhiri to our school
  - o include waiata/himine in the Mass
- To review the Te Reo curriculum school wide and construct a local Te Reo curriculum. This curriculum needs to dove tail with the Waitomo Arotahi Kahui Ako local curriculum, the Religious Education curriculum and the needs of our students whanau.
- To communicate more clearly the ways that St. Joseph's caters for Maori achievement.
- To arrange at least two hui a year with the Maori community.
